

Checklist Predatory Journals

Recently, the terms *predatory journal* and *predatory publisher* have been much discussed in German as well as international media. *Predatory journals* are dubious, only feigned academic journals. Accordingly, their publishers are called predatory as well. These journals charge for publishing articles without implementing any quality assurance procedures.

This checklist tries to help you assessing a journal's academic respectability. If you can answer one of the following questions with a 'yes', you should become suspicious. Should you answer two or more questions with 'yes', you might want to consider choosing another publication.

Further Information

Should our checklist have made you suspicious of a journal, the University Library's Open Access Team would be happy to conduct more in-depth research. Among other things, we check the following criteria:

- Is the journal listed in the [Directory of Open Access Journals](#) (DOAJ)?
The DOAJ is a directory of open access journals that fulfil certain quality features and that are trustworthy.
- Is the publisher a member of the [Open Access Scholarly Association](#) (OASPA)?
The OASPA is an association of publishers that have committed themselves to strict quality criteria. Publications by these publishers are implicitly trustworthy.
- Are the publisher and/or editor members of [Committee on Publication Ethics](#) (COPE)?
COPE advises publishers and editors on all questions of publication ethics. All members of COPE are expected to adhere to the [COPE code of conduct](#) as well as their guidelines.
